Reminder to waterfront residents

We would like to draw your attention to the importance of vegetating shoreline buffers.



We invite all waterfront property owners to consult the link provided for more information on shoreline vegetation and its environmental benefits.

As you may have noticed, the Municipality also had to comply with the environmental regulations of the Ministry of the Fight Against Climate Change, Wildlife and Parks (MLCCFP) in order to obtain the necessary authorizations for the shoreline stabilization work carried out last September on Rivière-Blanche Road.

Extension of the new residential pool safety rules

The Government of Québec has postponed by one year the implementation of the Residential Swimming Pool Safety Regulation. Homeowners will therefore have more time to comply with the new requirements.

These rules aim to better protect young children and include, among other things:

- installing a fence or barrier at least 1.2 metres high around the pool;
- having a self-closing and self-latching gate equipped with a safety device;
- prohibiting direct access to the pool from a house (for example, a patio door opening directly onto the pool area).

Temporary car shelters

In accordance with current regulations: Temporary car shelters may be installed from November 1 of the current year until May 15 of the following year. These shelters must respect a setback of 1.50 meters from the road right-of-way and a lateral clearance of 0.75 meters. (Bylaw 2011-03)

Does your dog have its tag?

We remind residents that it is mandatory to register your dog each year, in accordance with provincial regulations (<u>Chapter P-38.002, r.1)</u>.

The annual renewal fee is \$10 per dog. This process ensures effective management of animals within the Municipality of Mayo and complies with the Provincial Act to Promote the Protection of Persons by Establishing a Framework Concerning Dogs.



Snow removal

To avoid interfering with snow removal operations and to ensure the safety of all road users, by-law 2009-001 prohibits depositing snow on the opposite side of the road. Offenders are subject to a fine.

Culvert maintenance

It is essential to ensure the regular maintenance of your culverts to allow proper drainage and prevent flooding on your property and nearby roads. By cleaning them and clearing away debris, you help protect not only your property but also the safety of the entire community.

A little attention today can prevent major problems tomorrow! (By-law 2021-04).

Ecocentre

Please note that you have until November 29 to use your 2025 access card for the Lochaber Township Ecocentre. The site will then be closed until next year.

What to recycle

Recycling is a simple action that makes a big difference! Be sure to properly sort your recyclables: paper, cardboard, plastics (codes 1 to 7, except for 6), glass, and metal. Avoid placing plastic bags, food wrap, and Styrofoam in your recycling bins.

To help, ask yourself these two questions before recycling:

- -Is it a container, packaging, or printed material?
- -ls it made of metal, glass, plastic, cardboard, or paper?

If the answer is "yes" to both questions, it's recyclable! Together, we can reduce waste and preserve the environment of our beautiful municipality.

Septic tank emptying - End of 2025 season

Sanivac is responsible for septic tank emptying in the municipality for the 2024–2027 period. They will be in the area during October to complete this year's scheduled work.

Important reminder:

- Septic tanks of permanent residences must be emptied every 2 years
- Septic tanks of secondary residences every 4 years

You will receive a notice by mail indicating the scheduled week for your property.

Please ensure that access to your septic tank is clear and unobstructed.

Roy Road

- · Crack sealing and line painting
- Application of surface sealant

- Shoreline stabilization and road reconstruction work
- Maintenance work (decohesion and paving)

History and heritage

The heroic beginnings of St-Malachy

Over a hundred years ago, the first families of St-Malachy arrived in a land filled with lakes, rivers and forests. They had to show great courage, strength and patience as they cut down giant trees like oaks and maples with very few tools. Horses and oxen were scarce; most families didn't have any. At that time, one in four people didn't even own an animal to help with the work.

Despite these challenges, some of the houses built back then are still standing today, a testament to the skill and determination of those pioneers who worked hard to build a new life even in a harsh and humble environment.

Money was also scarce. Families survived mainly through hard work, and every member had a role depending on their age. Women worked in the fields and helped build houses, all while caring for their children. They spun wool, sewed clothes, prepared food for the winter and gathered medicinal plants. Some even used animal bones carved into needle shapes for sewing.

To get what they didn't have, people went to the general store and bartered goods. The timber industry was central to life in the area, and men built sleds to haul wood to Buckingham or Thurso. Often, they burned land to collect ashes, which they sold in Bytown (now Ottawa). In Mayo, you can still see the spot near the cemetery where wood was once burned to make ash.

Some residents also worked in the mines, such as the Black Lead Mines or Feldspar, where iron ore was extracted. Others sold hay to feed the horses used by logging companies.

It was a difficult but proud era. In 1899, this chapter of history closed with a public referendum on fences. Thankfully, Mayo's archives continue to keep alive the memory of these brave pioneers.
